# **CITY/COUNTY PROPERTY TAX 2023-24**



By now you should have received your Notice of Property Tax Assessment for Tax Year

2023-24. If you have not noticed, the property values have increased significantly. In some cases, as much as 60%. The actual amount of taxes to be paid does not appear on this document. You will receive the actual bill in July of 2023. It looks like we can all expect a hefty increase in our taxes next year. Residents will pay \$3.50/\$1000 of assessed value. Non-resident owners get to pay \$4.50/\$1000. Resident owners also get a homeowner's exemption which helps on the taxes due.

Without going into a lot of detail, the assessment in Hawaii is based on the actual market value of property. The value of our condos has increased significantly and so will our tax. If you want to file an appeal, you have until January 13, 2023. Check the bottom of your Assessment Notice for details. Hawaii News Now has an excellent report on this issue. ## \*\*DIS 'N 'DAT - New Year's Traditions



Ringing in the New Year in the United States takes on many forms. Millions of Americans watch the countdown to midnight and the

dropping of the Times Square Ball. We make a list of New Year's Resolutions. We host New Year's Eve parties, kiss our partners, and sing Auld Lang Syne at the stroke of midnight. Some look forward to the annual New Year's Parade and football fans enjoy a glut of college bowl games.

As we branch out around the world there are some interesting variations to the celebration of the New Year.



Some Germans practice *BleigieBen* or "lead pouring." A small amount of lead is melted with a candle and dropped in water. The shape that is formed is said to predict the persons fate for the coming year.

Brazilians will don a pair of new (bright colored) underwear. The color of the underwear symbolizes their wish for the upcoming year. Gold is for wealth; Red/Pink

for love; Green for hope; and Blue for good health. If it were me, I would wear multi-colored shorts and hope for all of these.



In the Philippines, a bowl of twelve fruits is prepared to symbolize each month of the year and to wish all a prosperous year. The fruit is eaten in the first few days of the New Year. The Spanish do it with 12 grapes symbolizing each strike of the clock in the final minute before midnight.







In Hawaii there are many unique and local traditions. Fireworks are set off to scare away evil spirits. Mochi is pounded by hand with the Kine (wooden mallet). It is formed

into patties which are symbols of good luck. Eat Jook (rice porridge) as the clock strikes midnight. Ahi Sashimi is also a very popular dish. But it gets expensive around the holidays.

On Oahu, locals take a First Day Hike to see the sun rise at Kaiwi State Shoreline while



others gather for a picnic at Ala Moana Beach Park.
