



## **President's Message**

Your Board of Directors had a very productive meeting on Saturday, April 21<sup>st</sup>. Our Resident Manager, Marlene Almodova, brought us up to date on projects and activities at KEE. Details will follow my comments in this newsletter. Treasurer Wendy Stafford summarized the status of the KEE Budget, and her report is also contained in this newsletter.

The Board currently has two standing committees. The Grounds and Landscape Committee and the Buildings and Infrastructure Committee. Serving on the Grounds Committee is Lori Miller and Scott Najima. The Buildings and Infrastructure Group includes Rick Rocheleau, Bert Wilkinson, Ete Savini and Myself.

Our grounds, landscaping, buildings, and the infrastructure that supports these are aging. Your Grounds Committee realizes that maintaining the vitality and appearance of our landscape requires a detailed plan. They are actively working on that plan.

The Buildings Committee is dealing with some significant challenges. An example is the waste drainpipes running under the floors of the ground units. When a pipe fails, the cost to the Association is nearly \$70,000. This cost does not include owner-responsible expenses. The Buildings Committee approach to this, and other issues, is to develop Inspection/Preventative Maintenance Plans to deal with issues before they occur.

The Board discussed the need to increase Owner awareness of major work projects going on near their units. We recognize the need for Owners to know in advance about work going on near their units. So, it looks like our new Board has its work cut out for us in 2023. We are committed to accomplishing our goals and we will keep you informed of our progress.

## **Resident Manager's Report**

We have a new Landscape Maintenance Company working at KEE. Aloha Aina has taken over from Island Green as of May 1<sup>st</sup>. We are expecting more onsite supervision and consistent staffing with our new contractor. We are also anticipating more expert advice to aid the Landscape/Grounds Committee in the creation of a long-rage plan for maintenance and enhancement of the property.

I am very happy to report the retrofit to strengthen our buildings against high winds has been completed. Mahalo to Bernardo and the crew on installing the Hurricane Clips.

We finished repairs to the sewer line in Building #15. This is the second occurrence of the failure of a common area drain. These type repairs are costly to Your Association and to the affected property owner. Given this, the Board has developed a program to identify problems before they occur.

In April, the Board of Water Supply completed an annual inspection of our property. One minor repair was required.

Occasionally we find some wood rot damage on our buildings. When damage occurs around a window or sliding door that was installed as part of a remodel or upgrade

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project, the Owner is responsible for repairs. (See Example Below). If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me.

I will finish up my report with a few examples of the work that is completed daily by our maintenance crew.

# **Treasurers Report**



Wendy Stafford reported on the status of the 2023 Budget through March 1, 2023.

The total Cash and Reserves of the

Association total \$1,743,188.62.

We have negative budget variances in a few areas. These include insurance, water utilities, plumbing repairs, payroll, and security costs.

These variances are not unusual as cost increases in these areas are not always predictable.

The good news is that the variance is more than offset by a favorable variance in the remainder of the budget.

The current annual budget as of March 1<sup>st</sup>, is in good shape with the Association's total Operating Expenses coming in at about 15 percent under budget,

#### \*\*DIS 'N 'DAT – Kau Kau on This Origin of Some Favorite Hawaiian Foods



We found some very interesting information in the June 2015 Edition of *Hawaii Magazine*.

An article was published that explores the roots of five local food favs of locals. We thought this would be a great topic for this month's *DIS 'N 'DAT*.

Our first food item is very familiar to me as I grew up with Portuguese Grandparents. I was surprised when I first came to Hawaii and saw **Malasadas** everywhere. They were introduced in Hawaii by Portuguese plantation workers who immigrated from the Azores and Madeira Islands. It was the grandson of an immigrant family, Leonard Rego, who popularized this food item. Of course, he was the founder of the iconic Leonard's.



The **Manapua** is another island staple. The steamed buns, filled with sweet char siu pork, were brought to Hawaii in the mid 1800's.

It is said that early Chinese entrepreneurs would fill large aluminum cans with Manapuas and other snacks. They would string the cans on poles



carried on their shoulders and peddle the snacks. While It is believed that pork was the original filling, Hawaii has taken the Manapua to another level with fillings that include hot dogs, sweet potato and curry chicken.

You can find **Boiled Peanuts** everywhere in Hawaii. One theory is they were brought Hawaii by US soldiers from the Southern States where they are sold everywhere. But another theory is that they were brought to Hawaii by Asian or Pacific Islanders. They are found in China, Thailand, Indonesia and the Philippines where they are spiced and boiled in various ways. We are not sure where they came from but we do know there is a "Hawaiian Way" to eat them.



There is some merit to the fact that the **Spam Musubi** is an original Hawaiian food, Spam was a staple food during the early stages of WWII. It is

believed that the Spam Musubi originated in the Japanese internment camps where spam and rice were layered in a baking pan and cut into slices. Of course, locals took it to another level with an individual loaf-style serving wrapped in Nori.

**Saimin** is a comfort-food staple. It originated during the Hawaiian Plantation era when Asian workers cooked up noodles with whatever



other food items were available. The basic seasoning recipe seems to be much the same now, as it was then. At one time, Saimin Stands were prevalent throughout the Islands. While there are fewer of these now, you can go to most McDonalds and get a bowl!

No matter where these foods originated, Hawaii has added their own flavors and flair to make them even more appetizing. We hope this article did not make you hungry for one of these treats. Especially if you are not currently on the islands!
