#### **ASSOCIATION INSURANCE FOR 2024**



Last month we reported on the 6% increase to the 2024 Monthly Maintenance Fee (MMF).

A whopping 63% bump in our Association's Insurance Policy is one of the causes for the rise in our MMF for 2024. Some of the Associations deductible amounts have also increased.

Our insurance agent has investigated this issue carefully and the scope of this trend is State and Nationwide.



Locally, building replacement costs have soared and this is a major reason why our rates have gone up.

Nationally, the insurance industry has suffered catastrophic losses in the Billions of dollars, and this does not include the firestorm disaster on Maui.

On a positive note, the changes to the Association's Policy should not have any effect on the level of coverage required of individual owners.
