All five trash room areas have been cleaned and painted. Inside and out.

We completed our annual fire extinguisher inspection and testing. Triple AAA company certified our fire suppression equipment to be in good working order.

Our crew is engaged in ongoing work on sidewalk and parking lot ramp repairs and

some repainting pavement lines.

On November 21st we completed the last plumbing replacement project for this year. Units 93,94,95 and 96 service lines were replaced.

It seems we repeat this message at this time every year.



Once again, we want to remind you to be wary of scammers trying to take advantage of the holiday season.

The Forbes Advisor published an article on the 5 biggest holiday scams of 2023. We feel this information is still timely.

Watch out for these!

Ads on Social Media Platforms cost consumers \$2.7 billion over the past two years. These scams entice you to buy items that you will never receive.

Package Delivery Theft has been going on for quite a while. Even in our gated community, packages left out and unattended are at risk. Plan to have them picked up by a trusted person if you will not be home.

Gift Card Scams are becoming more and more creative. There are too many types to list here. Don't make payments with gift cards. If you buy one off the rack, check to make sure it has not been tampered with.



Charity Scams can really steal your holiday spirit. Stick with well-known charity groups, don't donate to a voice over the phone and do not donate gift cards, a wire transfer or cryptocurrency.

Vacation Rental Scams are common this time of year. Seems that crooks post rental properties online and then deal directly with consumers to take their cash. Dealing with reputable travel sites is the way to avoid this problem.

**DIS 'N 'DAT Christmas In Hawaii.



Of course, we all know that Christmas is not a holiday that is indigenous to Hawaii. It was introduced in the islands by western missionaries, and settlers in the 1800's.

Over time, native Hawaiians adopted the holiday. As they did, they put their own local spin on many of the Christmas Traditions.

As we approach the Christmas Holiday; here are a few interesting facts about the history of Christmas in Hawaii and some of the unique local ways that Hawaiians celebrate this holiday.

The first Christmas on record in Hawaii was in 1786. George Dixon, Captain of the British ship Queen Charlotte, was docked in Waimea Bay on the island of Kauai on Christmas Day.

He and his crew celebrated with a roasted pig dinner. It is said they toasted family and friends back home with drinks of rum and coconut milk. Little did they know how close they came to inventing the pina colada.

King Kamehameha IV and Queen Emma of Hawaii officially celebrated Christmas in 1856 as a day of Thanksgiving.

On Christmas Eve of 1858 Mary Dominis (mother-in-law of Queen Lili'uokalani). threw



a Christmas party at Washington Place in Honolulu.

The party featured the first recorded appearance of Santa Claus on the

islands and the first known placement of a decorated Christmas tree.

This tradition is honored each year with a Christmas Open House Ceremony. A replica of the original Christmas tree is placed for

public view.



Hawaiians often refer to Santa Claus as "Shaka Santa". He wears open shirts, shorts and flip flops. Santa is often seen waving the "hang loose" hand sign in Hawaii.

Mrs. Claus is known as Tutu Mele and she wears a muumuu with a hibiscus flower in her hair.

Santa (Kanakaloka) arrives in Hawaii on a

canoe, paddling in from the ocean to the beach. It seems that reindeer and sleigh just do not work on the islands.





Mele Kalikimaka is the Merry Christmas greeting in Hawaii. In 1949, Bing Crosby and the Andrews Sisters recorded a

Christmas Song entitled Mele Kalikimaka.

The song has become a holiday standard in Hawaii. To hear the original, just click on the image above.



Hawaiians celebrate Christmas traditionally with decorations and a Christmas tree. residents purchase Norfolk pine trees grown in Hawaii. Others decorate palm trees with



the usual festive bulbs, lights and Hawaiian ornaments.

Most Christmas trees are shipped in from the US Mainland.

Agriculture officials expect 135 containers of Christmas trees and wreaths to arrive in Hawaii this season. So far, about 88 have arrived. Over 60,000 trees will be shipped to Hawaii this year.

Many in Hawaii will celebrate with a western style meal; but Hawaiians also favor traditional local foods. Kalua Pig will replace roasted turkey or spiral ham. Poke will serve as an appetizer and steamed rice will replace mashed potatoes. Finally add Lomi-Lomi Salmon with Laulau and Poi as side dishes.


This annual event is back in 2024. Honolulu City Lights kicks off the Christmas Season with a Tree Lighting
