### President's Message

This month marks Bernardo Cacal's 48<sup>th</sup> year of service to our community. There are really no words to describe the value of his work. We are extremely fortunate to have such a dedicated and talented person as our maintenance supervisor. Please take the time to thank him when you see him at work.

Please note our next Board Meeting will be held on Saturday, October 12<sup>th</sup> at 10am at the Pavilion. This is an important meeting as we expect to approve our 2025 Annual Budget.

We are looking to open all future Board Meetings for remote access. If we can get set up for the October meeting, we will send out the link in a separate email.

This month, we will start on our final sewer pipe replacement job for 2024. The work, on Units in Building 9, will be completed in early November and we will not be scheduling any work for the remainder of the year.

We have finalized a contract with Pragmatic Professional Engineers and RTM Electrical Corporation for an Electrical Service System Inspection. The inspection will be completed in early October.

We have also hired C2C Engineering to provide required design and engineering work for our underground sanitary replacement project.

Once the contracted work is complete, we will develop the workplan/schedule and finalize our financing.

Just a final comment on our Association Budget. We are facing a significant increase

in the Monthly Maintenance Fee. Our insurance has more than doubled. We have a lot of work ahead in the replacement of our sewer lines. We also must budget to keep our Reserve Fund at the State mandated level.

Your Board remains committed to developing the best possible solutions to deal with these Issues. You will be kept informed. If you have any questions, contact us.

I know this community will come together and we will maintain our property, structures and great quality of life that we enjoy at Kuilima Estates East.

Naupaka Flower Legend
This flower grows only in
Hawaii. We have
Naupaka growing on our
property. It can be used
for lei making and unique
for a bloom that looks like
a half-flower. There is a
reason for that look.

Long ago on the island of Kauai two young hula school students, *Nau and Paka*, fell in love. They met secretly because, at that time, their relationship was taboo with punishment as death.

They were discovered by their evil hula school master Kilo. They attempted to run away, and Kilo gave chase.

At a cave near the beach, the young boy, Nau, told Paka to hide. He than ran up the mountain hoping to lead Kilo away.

But Paka tried to stop Kilo and was killed on the spot. Kilo then caught and killed Nau on the mountain top.

As legend has it, on the spot where both Nau and Paka died, new flowering plants grew. But the flowers only had half of the petals.

The half flowers are a reminder that Nau and Paka are forever separated except when one puts these two half-flowers together to form a complete circle. This allows Nau and Paka to be together for a brief moment as the petals are joined.



## Legend of Haleakala (House of the Sun)



Folklore has it that the Sun God La, was a lazy god who liked to sleep which deprived the islands of sunlight.

This angered Hina (goddess of motherhood, the ocean and moon).

Her son, Maui decided to do something about this so he made a long, strong rope out of coconut fiber and climbed in darkness to the top of Haleakala crater.

When La finally appeared, Maui lassoed the god and tied him to a nearby tree.

Trapped and helpless, La begged to be released. Maui demanded more light every day in exchange for La's freedom. The Sun God made the deal and kept his promise.

Since then, the Hawaiian Islands have been bathed in light and Mount Haleakala on Maui became a sacred place of the gods the "House of the Sun".
