This is an important meeting as we expect to approve our 2026 Annual Budget. We will provide more details on our major projects at this meeting.

We have selected a contractor to complete the waste line work. Warrior Construction, a general contractor, will be hired following final contract negotiations and a legal review of the terms. We are very happy with the bid proposal received from Warrior.

Just a final comment on our Association Budget. We will have to finance essential project work in 2026. It appeared that an owner assessment was the only option but that has changed. We promised to consider all financing choices, and we did. It appears that a better plan may work for us. If so, it will require approval by owner vote. More to come on this at the November meeting.

Resident Manager's Report:

It was last September when I started to add pictures to my report. It is certainly a better way to show the daily work performed by your maintenance crew.



We had another waste line failure in September. We were fortunate that the repair could be completed outside of the affected units. NK Plumbing responded and completed the work in two days. They had to

dig about 10 feet deep to get to the pipe. It was in an area that we had identified as a potential problem.



We continue to replace sections of wood siding as necessary.



We also dedicated some time to our pool areas. This included replacement of rusted fixtures, general paint touch-up and deep cleaning of the grills.





In the last DA KINE, I mentioned some problems with four autograph trees bordering Kuilima Drive near Building 1.



The landscape committee has recommended removal of the trees.

The board is looking at our budget to see when the work can be done.

Finally, Halloween is approaching. Please note that door-to-door trick or treat activities are prohibited at KEE.


Don’t Take Pork over the Pali
